1. Do you agree with the proposed changes to the oral health therapy scope of practice? If not, please explain.

No.

Main seasons:

- a- Full treatment planning is very important rather than isolated (one filling/one thing) approaches. b- The quality of restorative work will deteriorate leading to many re-dos and problems including the need for more endodontic treatments and extractions. Most oral health therapists do not have the appropriate knowledge and experience to perform the required restorative work on adults. c- Many practice owners will use the new oral health therapists for fast financial gains (cheap dentistry).
- d- Most patients are already confused about the difference between all the new emerging dental professions. I do not think we need another one.
